Good Day Cimarron!

I would like to say that due to the diligent efforts of the residents of Cimarron the water conservation efforts are going well. The water levels are slowly rising in the reservoir. Currently we are not able to access the secondary water source, the river, until it has cleared up. The Office of the State Engineer in Cimarron is monitoring the water and levels. The Village has booklets available in the Utility office that can be used as a guide to provide additional information on water conservation efforts. The public works employees are working extra hard to make sure the community has water to Town.

We would like to thank Philmont Conservation crews for all the hard work they have put in to clean the silt out of the storage box. It is due to this effort that water is continually flowing into the Village. Thank You Philmont! The procurement process for the Village Hall roof project has started and the project will be awarded soon. The Village has sent in an application for funding for a preliminary engineering plan for the water remediation efforts for the reservoir and for the Village. The plan will help to identify the impacts of the fire and the potential funding options to implement the plan. The Village has approved the OEI-Stantec for the Engineering of the NMDOT project for the bridges.

Recycle when possible and remember cardboard must be clean.

WATER CONSERVATION

Helpful Hints to Conserve Water

Kitchen: Use dishwasher only when full. Keep a pan in the sink to rinse dishes before putting in the dishwasher. Use bottled water for drinking and making coffee. Clean counters & appliances with sterile wet wipes or use cleaners and paper towels. Use paper goods for snacks, deserts and cold drinks.

Bathroom: Use a clean container to collect the cold water before shower when wanting for it to heat. Use extra cold water for cleaning purposes. When showering wet, turn off water, lather/wash, turn on water, rinse. Use a brick in the toilet tank to take up space in the tank, which uses less water each flush. Don't flush after each urine use. Shorten shower time. Shower less , every other day. Use a paper cup when brushing teeth.

Yard: Use barrels or containers to collect rain water from the roof drains.

Washing machine: Wash only full loads. Wash only once a week or twice a week. Donate water bottles to the food.

These are suggestions from citizens who are practicing conservation methods.
