CLERK ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Greetings Village of Cimarron and Happy Thanksgiving Month! Fall made it and Winter has set in. Just a few updates, NMDOT Aviation has approved the remarking and repairs of the Heliport pad which will include reflective paint. The Lafayette project is progressing and within the budget and timeline. As for the Water Rights-4 acre foot of Senior Water Rights purchase is in the process this will give the Village of Cimarron approximately one month supply of water with a high priority. Currently we are in the process of acquiring additional material from NMDOT so Mountain Meadows road can get done soon. The other projects are still in design this includes the USDA Water Plant Rehabilitation Project, CWLF Wastewater Line Replacement Project, The CDBG Project Replacement of Water/Wastewater Lines. The Street Projects have not received Environmental Clearance from NMED to proceed and when we have the final approval the project will continue. The water at the Cimarroncito is sustaining and we will have a project up there soon which will be the replacement of the head gate at the silt box. There are no water restrictions at this time and the reservoir is full. If you have any questions or comments please stop by and visit. Shawn Jeffrey


